Dear Stuyvesant Math Student,

If you are currently enrolled in Geometry, Algebra 2, or Pre-calculus, you will be taking the final exam for your math class on Monday, January 25, 2021. Like the summer assignment and its corresponding exam, you will complete the exam on DeltaMath. The exam will be posted under the same department account as the summer assignment, not your math teacher's DeltaMath account. As a reminder, that teacher code is 595791. The exam will be open from 9:10 a.m. until 10:40 a.m. on Monday, January 25th. If you are entitled to testing accommodations, the exam will stay open longer so that you will receive them.

As soon as you have completed the exam, you will need to upload your work on Google Classroom. Your teacher will create an assignment where you can upload this work. You may use your own graphing calculator, Desmos, or the calculator on DeltaMath. You may access your notes and any other class materials, but you may not use any other websites or online programs to answer any of the questions, nor may you consult any other student. As this is an exam, the [Academic Integrity Policy](#) will apply.

To prepare you for this exam, your teachers have created a review assignment that covers all of the necessary content. This assignment will be posted on your teacher's own DeltaMath account.

While taking the exam, please be mindful of the following guidelines and expectations:

1. You may move from question to question by clicking "Next Question" at the top of the screen. Once you click "Submit Answer," however, you may not return to that question. Only click "Submit Answer" when you are sure you have the right answer. Please note that if you move to another question without submitting an answer, DeltaMath will not save anything you've entered for that question.
2. Unless you are specifically told to round your answer, DeltaMath expects you to express your answer as an exact value. If you include a decimal answer instead of the exact value, your answer will be marked wrong. For example, if you use your calculator to compute $\frac{\sqrt{3}}{2}$ and express your answer as a decimal without specifically being told how to round, it will be marked incorrect.
3. If you are told to express your answer as a rounded answer, DeltaMath will only mark your answer correct if it is rounded to the correct decimal place. For example, if the correct answer rounded to the nearest hundredth is meant to be 3.29 and you enter 3.294 or 3.3, it will be marked incorrect.
4. If the question asks you to express your answer as an equation, the answer will be marked incorrect if your answer is an expression. For example, if the correct answer is meant to be the equation $y = 2x + 1$ and you enter $2x + 1$ as your answer, it will be marked incorrect.
5. If you have any questions or concerns while taking the exam, please email your teacher immediately.
