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For ease of use, these newsletters are organized by different categories, such as Academic Programs, Business Internships & Jobs, STEM Opportunities, Community Service, and so on.

Here are some highlights for this week:

For students who enjoy the visual & performing arts, the deadline for the free **Summer Arts Institute** (at Frank Sinatra HS in Astoria, Queens) has been extended to February 8th. Current 9th, 10th and 11th graders may apply. There is also an in-person ‘**Arts Careers Open House**’ afterschool event offered by the Arts Connection non-profit group on February 1st in Manhattan. And the **Whitney Museum’s Youth Insights** spring program allows students to engage with artists & curators at their weekly sessions –the application deadline is January 31st!

In the STEM section, there are numerous opportunities to peruse. **STEM Matters** is a free one-week program during the spring break, and it offers a variety of different programs throughout the city. The **NYU GSTEM** program for juniors also covers various STEM fields – the application deadline is February 1st! **Cooper Union’s STEM Saturdays** focuses on Virtual Reality innovations and is open to current 9th, 10th, and 11th graders. The **New York Historical Society’s Tech Scholars** programs offers female-identifying students both a weekly spring term series of sessions (application deadline: January 29th) and a one-week (4/10 – 4/14) spring break program (3/5 deadline). And the **Quantum Computing Introductory Course** is a free virtual four-day opportunity for all students to learn about this exciting new field of computer science (application deadline: January 29th!).

There are several new **writing contests**, ranging from STEM Writing to Poetry, Mystery writing and more- some have February 1st application deadlines.

And, in the LEADERSHIP section, the TGR Foundation offers a free virtual interactive **Scholarship Application Workshop** on January 31st.
