Here are some highlights for this week:

---In the EVENTS section, students thinking of taking a college level class in spring or summer can check out this coming Tuesday's (1/24) after school (in-person) "**Summer National Program Fair**" at John Jay College in Manhattan; there will be a wide variety of programs represented.

And students thinking of taking a college level class in the spring or summer can check out the January 28th virtual **Pre-College Program Fair** (repeated on 2/25). Many major colleges & universities will participate.

---In the PARKS and JOBS sections, all students can apply to volunteer or work (depending on age) as Discovery Guides or in other positions at local zoos and the Aquarium via the **NYC Wildlife Conservation Society's Discovery Guide Program**. And all students can find summer opportunities to volunteer or work at local zoos and the Aquarium via the **NYC Wildlife Conservation Society's Job/Internship/Volunteering Fair on Saturday, February 4th**. ---In the STEM section, there are numerous new opportunities to peruse. **MIT** offers several different programs, including its **Lincoln Lab** free virtual spring term STEM courses, along with virtual & in-person summer options – preference to current juniors. **Stanford University's SSTEM Summer Program** welcomes applications from current juniors and seniors.

The students we most want to connect with often believe they are not qualified enough for our program, but we know from years of experience that the support of a trusted adult (like a mentor or teacher) can make all the difference in a student finding the confidence to apply.

The aim of this program is to provide each participant with a unique opportunity to move beyond their comfort zone through field-based science research projects, wilderness exploration, and nature-based art. We do not consider a student’s grades in our selection process; we just want to connect with participants ready to explore their own curiosity, creativity, and courage. In the summer of 2023 (Covid permitting), supportive, experienced, and knowledgeable guides and scientists will lead participants in mountaineering, kayaking or packrafting in Alaska, or rock climbing in Colorado. Please note that travel outside of the USA is not required to participate in this program.”
